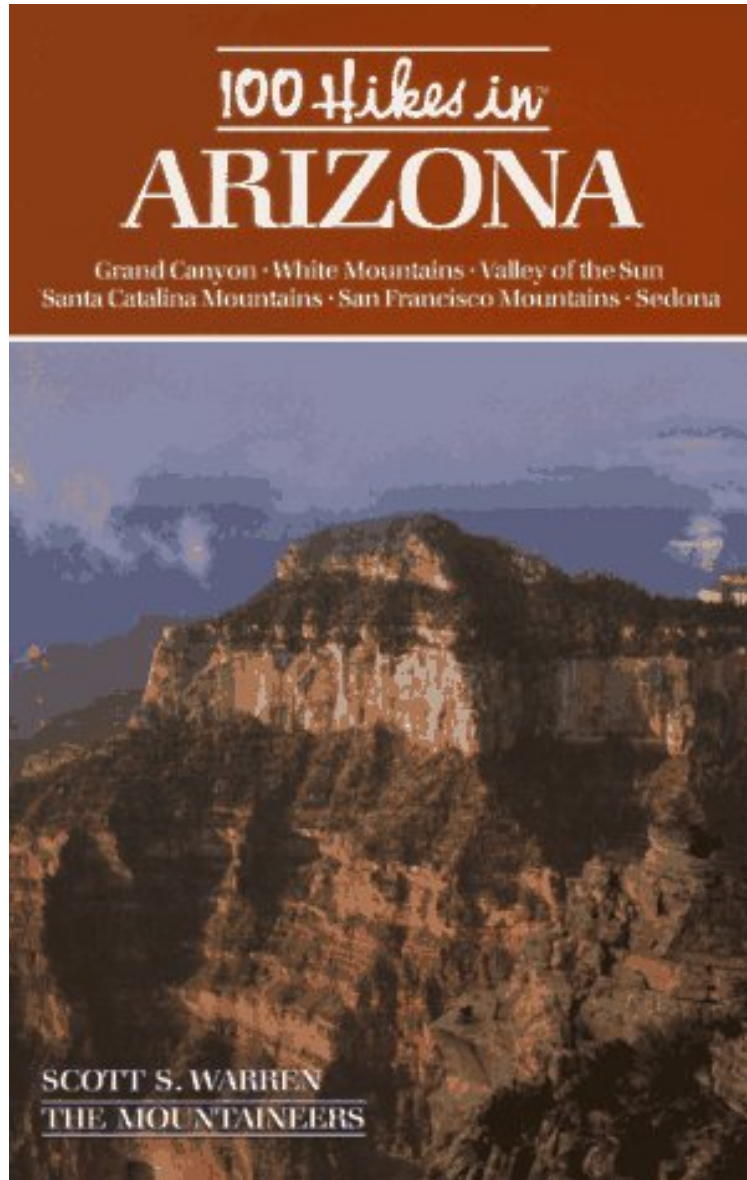

Trinity Alps, the Southern Cascade Range, and northern Sierra Nevada. Warren's Arizona guide, which starts with
Grand Canyon trips and then roams around the state, includes the San Francisco Peaks, White Mountains, Mogollon
Rim, Santa Catalinas, and Chiricahuas. Both these hiking guides follow a logical and useful format, starting with
general comments on topography, climate, flora, and fauna. They then move to more specific detail on hiking
difficulty, time (round-trip), elevation start, high (or low) point, season, and U.S. Geological Survey topo map
reference. Well-written descriptions of each hike will give readers ample information to decide whether or not a hike
is of interest to them. The useful format integrates a map (usually about half a page) and a photo of the surroundings
