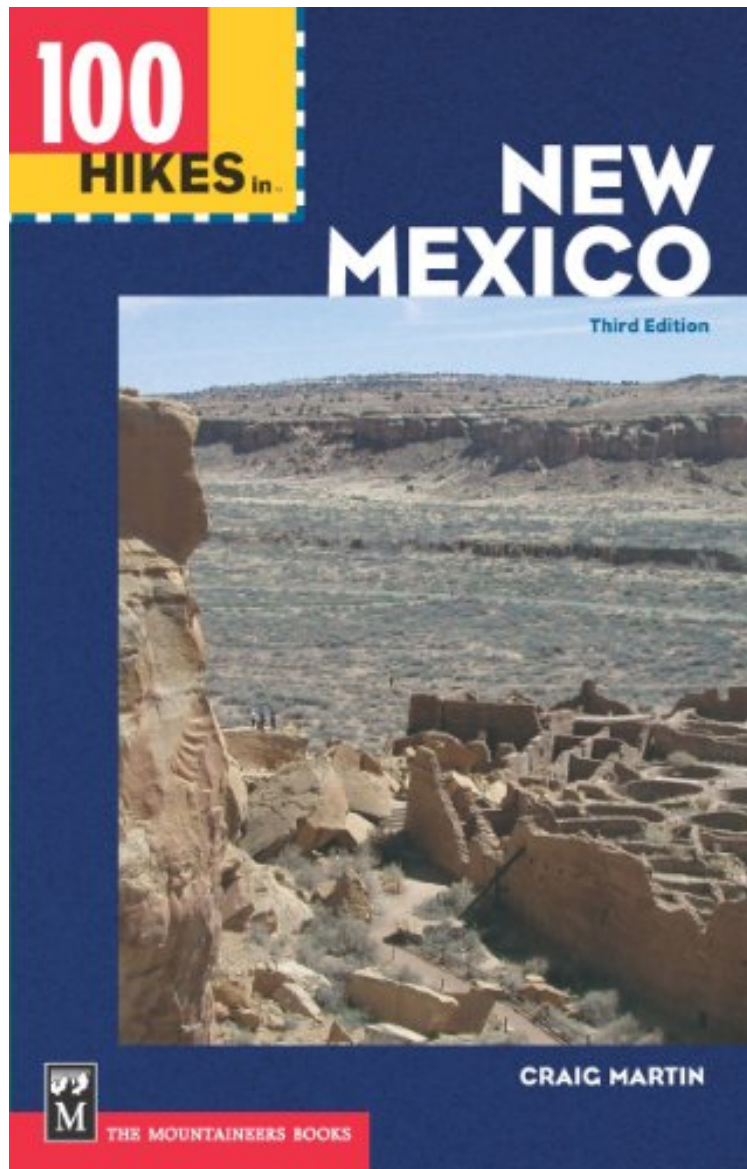

Each trail description includes a high-level map with highlights, difficulty, length, elevation change, agency responsible, fee information, best time of year to hike and a narrative about the trail. This is all very helpful when planning a trip where

you've never been. I found the descriptions accurate for the trails we hiked. My only quibble is that the majority of the hikes covered are in the northern part of the state. There were only a handful covered in the Southeastern Mountains where we were staying. However, there is a section in the back of the book providing address, phone number and website for the various agencies managing the lands. 6 of 6 people found the following review helpful. One area that is missing is the Caja del Rio area west of Santa Fe, but the author has written a separate guide for this area (if you can find it). Recommended.

Interesting on-the-trail information such as the history of old mining camps, homesteads, and ghost towns is provided. Most hikes are quickly accessible from the urban centers of Santa Fe and Albuquerque.
