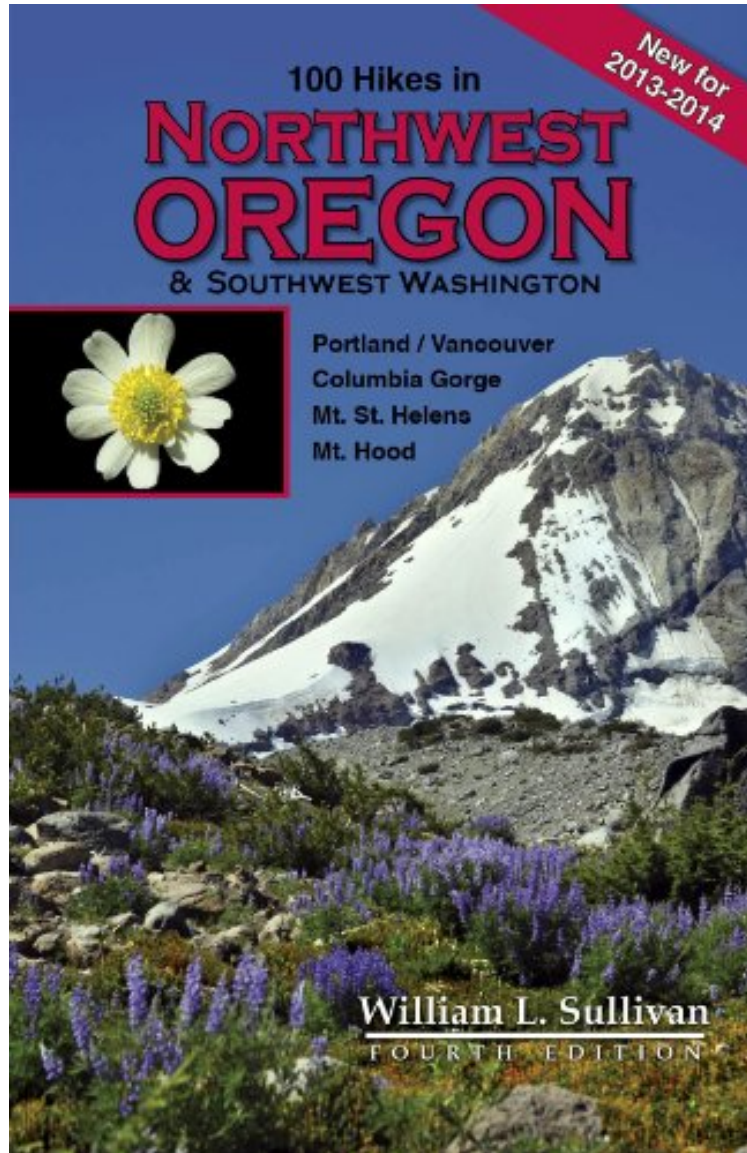

After earning his English degree from Cornell University and studying at Germany's Heidelberg University, he completed an M.A. in German at the University of Oregon. In 1985 Sullivan set out to investigate Oregon's wilderness on a 1361-mile solo backpacking trek from the state's westernmost shore at Cape Blanco to Oregon's easternmost point in Hells Canyon. His journal of that two-month adventure, *Listening for Coyote*, was chosen one of Oregon's 100 Books.
