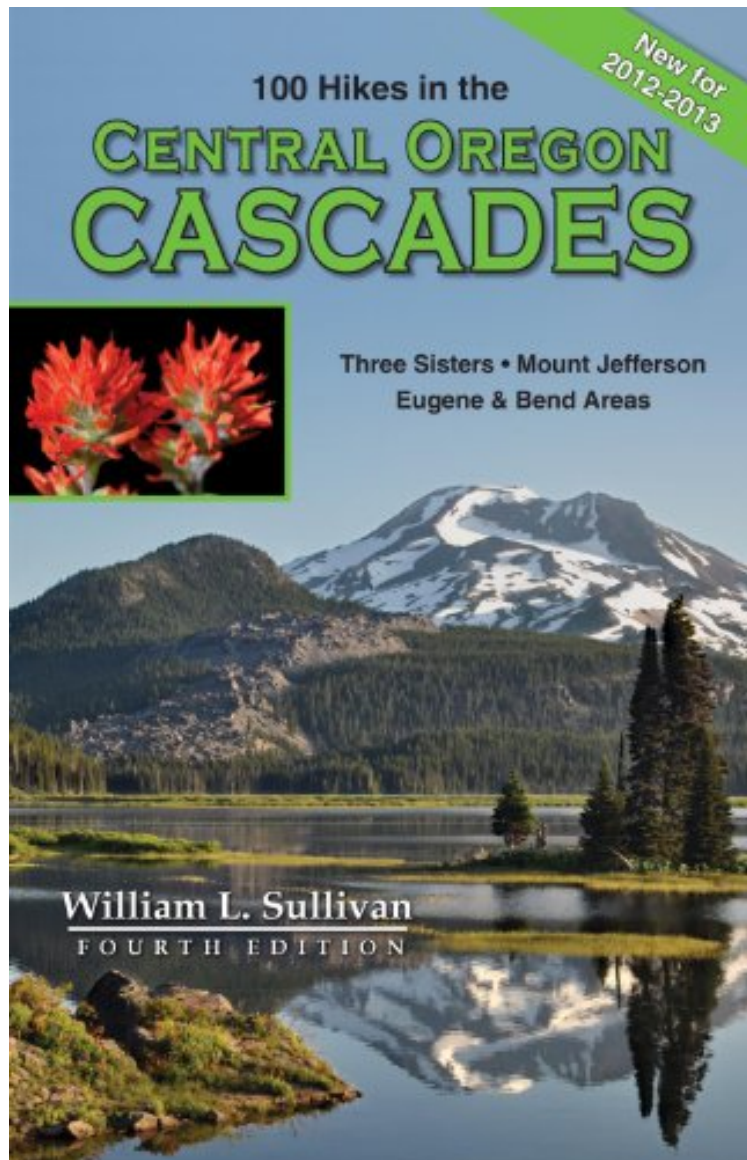

We used three of the hikes in May 2014 and found all the directions to be accurate and easy to follow. A great balance of the necessities - like how to get to trail head and where to park, and the interesting - what you will see on the trail, etc. Also - it tells you the season the trails are generally open and free from snow. I have two other guidebooks to the area that don't tell you that so you could end up driving to a trail head only to find 6 feet of snow in May.... Sullivan's books are awesome, they make you feel like an old-hand insider, and lead you to all sorts of overlooked amazing experiences throughout Oregon. The details are just insane, it doesn't seem possible that one person would have had the patience and experience to put all this together. The only thing to be aware of is that his drawings make things look much less steep/dramatic than they are. It would also help if the drawings made it obvious where you are in deep forest vs. exposed. I know it would be hard to draw all the trees/forest, but as-is, you don't realize how much of a hike is in a closed-in forest, rather than open-feeling. Finally, it would be helpful if he included a "drama" score -- there are often so many nearby hikes to choose from that it's hard to pick one -- a few have been somewhat underwhelming in terms of payoff, so a drama score would help.

The most comprehensive, reliable guide to the trails of Oregon's recreational heartland now includes hot springs, museums, brewpubs, fire lookout rentals, wildflowers, campgrounds, parks, and other travel tips for Bend, Sisters, Sunriver, Eugene, and Salem. Updated every year, this book features trails for families, day hikers, backpackers, mountain bikers, equestrians, and dog owners. For adventurers, there's even a list of 104 more hikes in the Central Oregon Cascades.

About the Author William L. Sullivan is the author of 18 books and numerous articles about Oregon, including an Oregon Trails column for the Eugene Register-Guard and the Salem Statesman-Journal. A fifth-generation Oregonian, Sullivan set out in 1985 to investigate Oregon's wilderness on a 1,361-mile solo backpacking trek from the state's westernmost shore at Cape Blanco to Oregon's easternmost point in Hells Canyon. His journal of that two-month adventure, published as *Listening for Coyote*, was chosen by the Oregon Cultural Heritage Commission as one of Oregon's 100 Books. Since then he has published four novels, two popular Oregon history books, and a collection of short stories, *The Oregon Variations*, that includes one story set in every county in the state.
