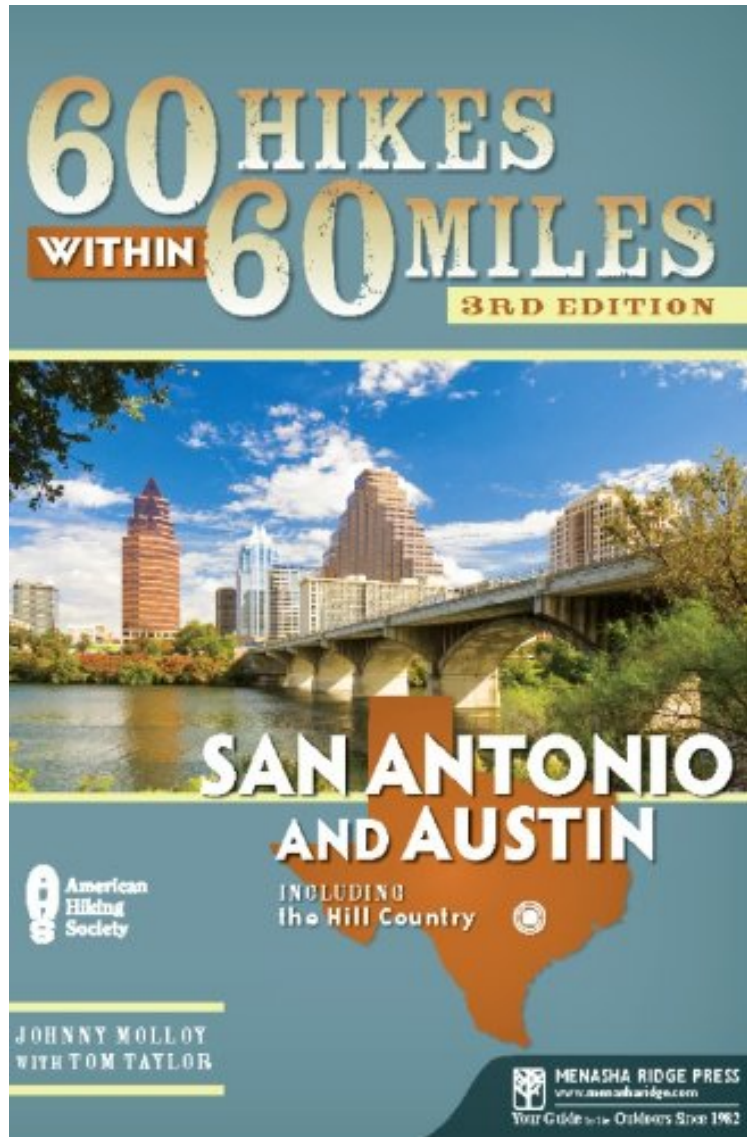

a list of hikes this book covers, but there were plenty of hikes. Almost all land in Texas is in private hands at the moment I liked how the book groups the hikes according to difficulty, scenery, and distance. Also liked the map in the front which indicated over all, where the hikes were in the region. The difficulty ratings initially threw me off--as a "moderate-difficult" hike to me was pretty easy. The graphs of elevation along the trails make them look steeper than they were. I really liked that in each of the three hikes that I did in the Hill Country area there were park rangers stationed there and well-stocked maps and other informational papers. The book, kindly indicated the hours of the ranger and also the park websites for more detailed trail maps. I have to say that coming from Rhode Island which is a truly beautiful area, that hiking the Hill Country (albeit just prior to the wildflower blooms) was fun but not 30% as pretty or interesting as it is over here, but I'm glad I did them. The descriptions of the hikes could have had a little more, but I did appreciate what was offered, which was pretty much what was described in the official park handout maps, etc. Often the park maps had more details and more trails, not indicated in the book diagrams.

I have Houston, Seattle and now this San Antonio/Austin 3rd edition. I have completed 6 hikes in this book so far. These books are great for those new to town or those that have been around for quite some time. One thing to note in this 3rd paperback edition; many of the latitude/longitude GPS coordinates are incorrect. Minutes and seconds can only go to 60 yet many of these coordinates are greater than 60 i.e. Onion Creek Loop has an incorrect longitude of 97 degrees, 72 minutes, 56.39 seconds. If you are using lat/longs in your GPS check all locations carefully before heading out in your vehicle. I have corrected many of the hikes using Google Earth Pro to pinpoint parking lot locations indicated on the maps. I don't see the 3rd edition paperback version offered here any longer; only the Kindle version. Perhaps the Kindle version has been corrected.
