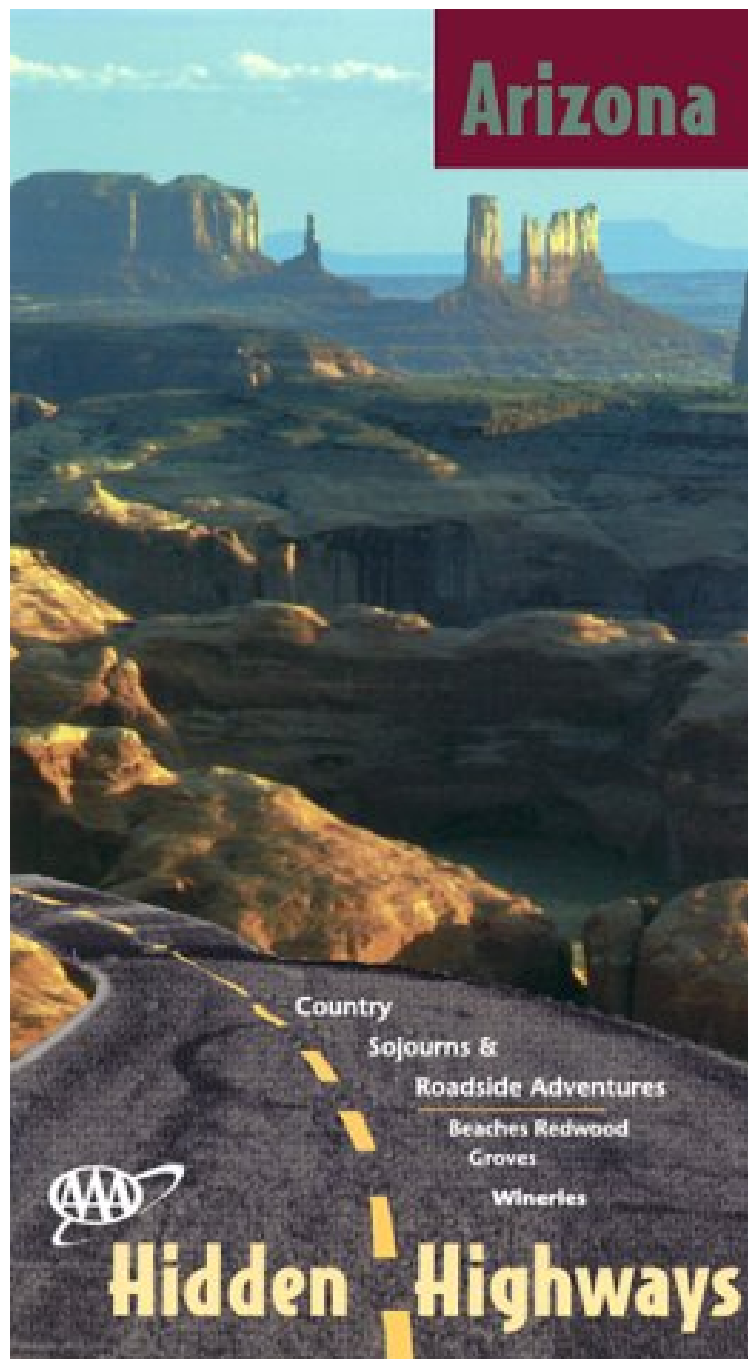

The book also guides travelers down secluded side roads to find ghost towns, red rock canyons, and other areas. It zeros in on the most distinctive or unusual places to stay, including one of only two surviving wigwam-style roadside motels.
