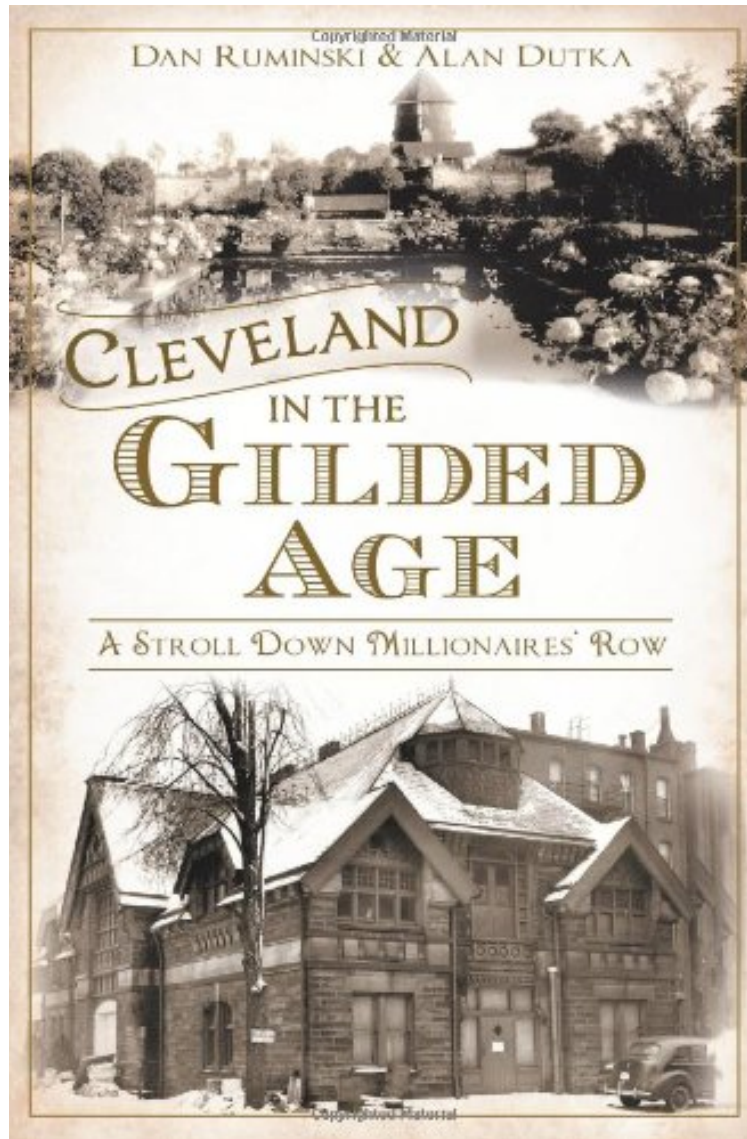

There were very few photos of the grand Euclid Avenue mansions that are mentioned throughout the slim volume. Lots of history about the owners, but few illustrations of the houses in which they lived. This is what I hoped the title would be about: the owners and their mansions. It's interesting to see photos of who built the houses, but I would have liked to see their mansions as well.
