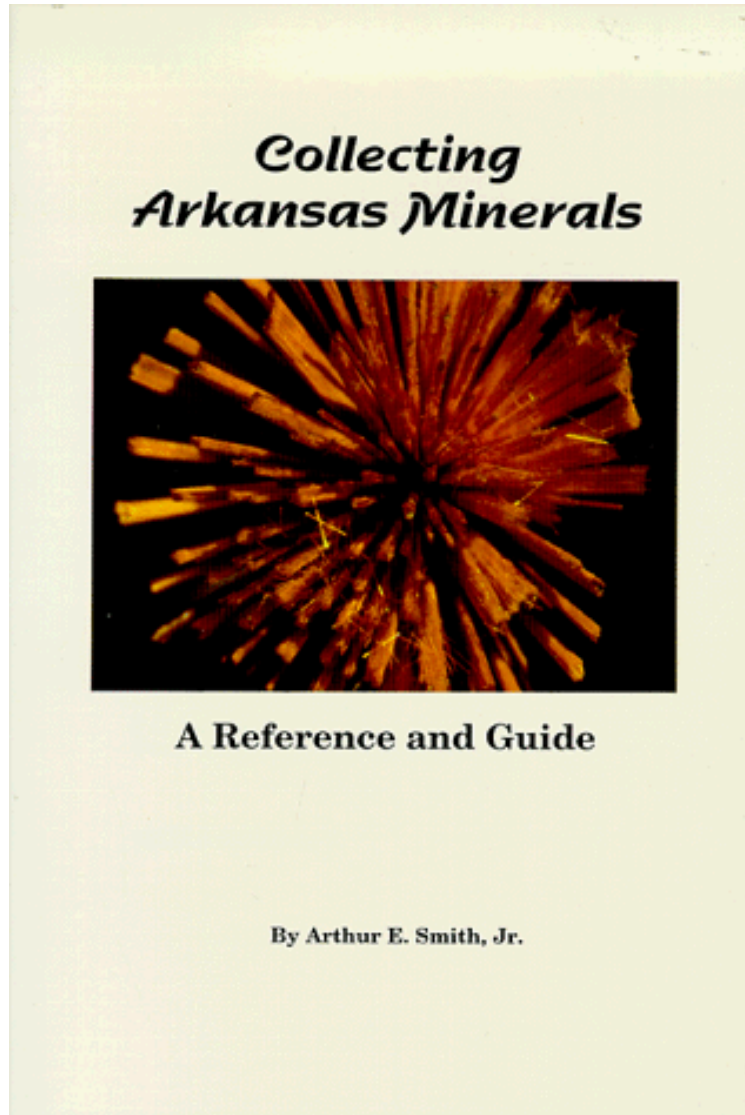

This book is a family guide and reference to the mineral localities with information on how to collect at each site. Each locality has a description of the locality and access, including a map for most. Other information includes recommendations for the equipment to use and sources for other information that the rockhound may find useful. There are many black and white photos of the minerals and a special section of color photos of the minerals. Collecting Arkansas Minerals is 149 pages long, contains black and white photographs, color photographs, maps and is softcover.
