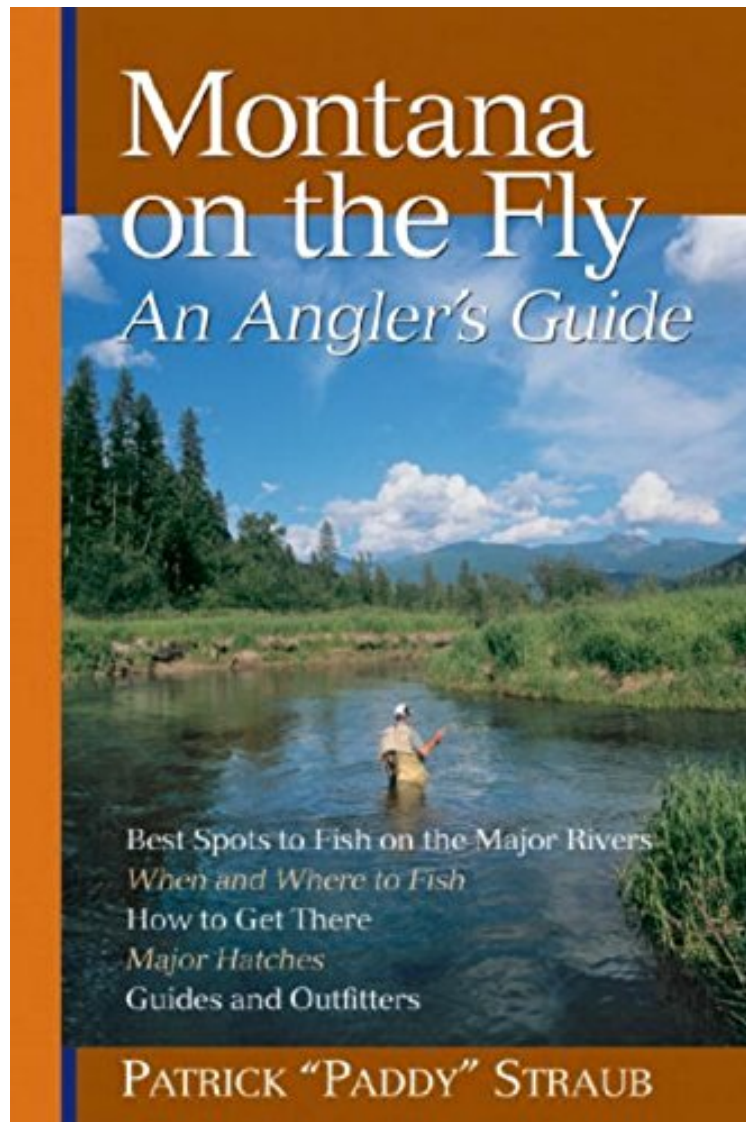

It helps you with choices on hotels, restaurants, and guide services in the various cities. Unfortunately, it's rather pathetic at anything more than that. If you're interested in hiking and fishing, wading some of the smaller creeks in Montana, or generally doing anything out of the ordinary, you're

better off looking into some of the other books like Craig Matthews's *The Yellowstone Fly-Fishing Guide*, which is simply perfect in every regard. Or *Montana's Best Fly Fishing* by Ben Romans, which is a better choice for those looking for more varied experiences. I would have liked to have seen more emphasis placed on wading options as well as a mention of some of the more traditional fly patterns that aren't made of environmentally atrocious materials like plastic and foam. What happened to simply Elk Hair Caddis for goodness sake?! Anyway, not one of my favorite guide books.
