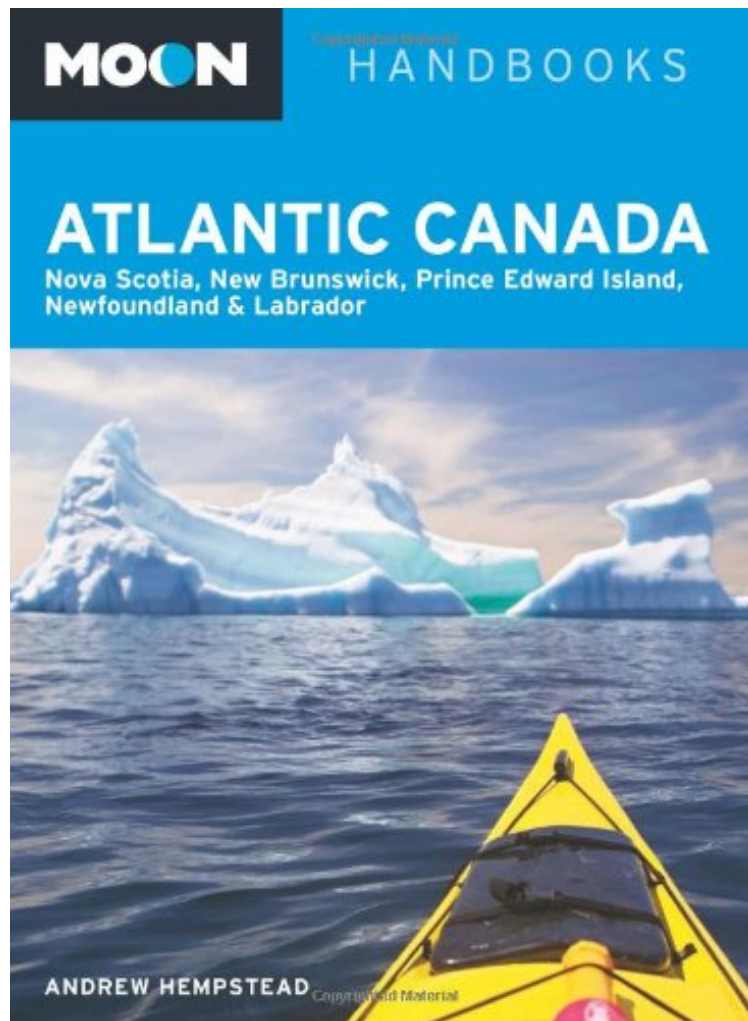

5 of 5 people found the following review helpful. Useless, except for the maps By Aoraki Save yourself the trouble and buy another Nova Scotia/Cape Breton/New Brunswick/PEI guidebook. This one is useless. The primary problem is the work is under-researched and lacks current information/background. Here are the issues we encountered: -Prices were out of date: From museum prices to restaurant prices to lodging prices, the prices quoted were more than 1 year out of

date (We traveled in May 2013, the book was published in May 2012).-Descriptions were useless: The reasons why attractions or restaurants are worth a visit were not included. Instead, we encountered descriptions like - Vegetarian restaurant X is a place that vegetarians go when hungry.-Limited historical information - A travel guidebook does not require heavy historical context. Instead it should cover highlights clearly and succinctly. This book does neither.- Limited wildlife information - self explanatory.Overall, the author uses a first-person narrative and repeats text (not to beat info into your head, but because [I believe] he can't be bothered to rephrase or add additional insights). Ultimately, this first-person narrative reads more like a stream-of-conscious writing rather than a well-researched, insightful travel guide book. I do not recommend this book to anyone traveling in Nova Scotia/Cape Breton/New Brunswick/PEI. I did not go to Newfoundland and Labrador, but when I do, I will steer clear of this book and author.0 of 0 people found the following review helpful. Nowhere in the book description could I find that info and wound up ordering both editions, not realizing they were the same book. We purchased The Moon Atlantic Canada mainly for the information about Newfoundland and Labrador. This chapter was only 30 pages, not nearly enough to provide adequate information. There is much to see in Newfoundland and Labrador that was not included in this book. Countless times during five weeks in Newfoundland and Labrador we would pick up this book seeking information only to find that it was not there.
