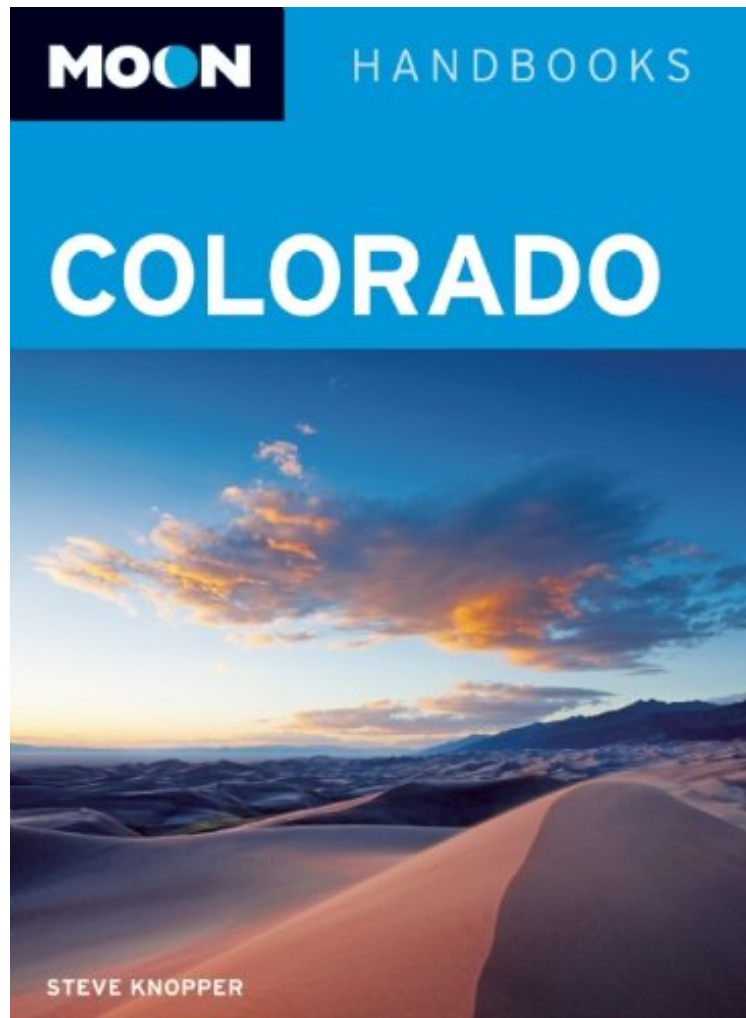

I especially like having the maps, as GPS can sometimes have trouble getting signal. In this case, I felt a few more detailed maps would have been helpful, as well as better details on the provided maps. This book was helpful for the tourist getting a "big picture," but I would have enjoyed a more ideas on slightly lesser known restaurants, parks, etc to avoid some crowds, yet get a locals feel for a place.
