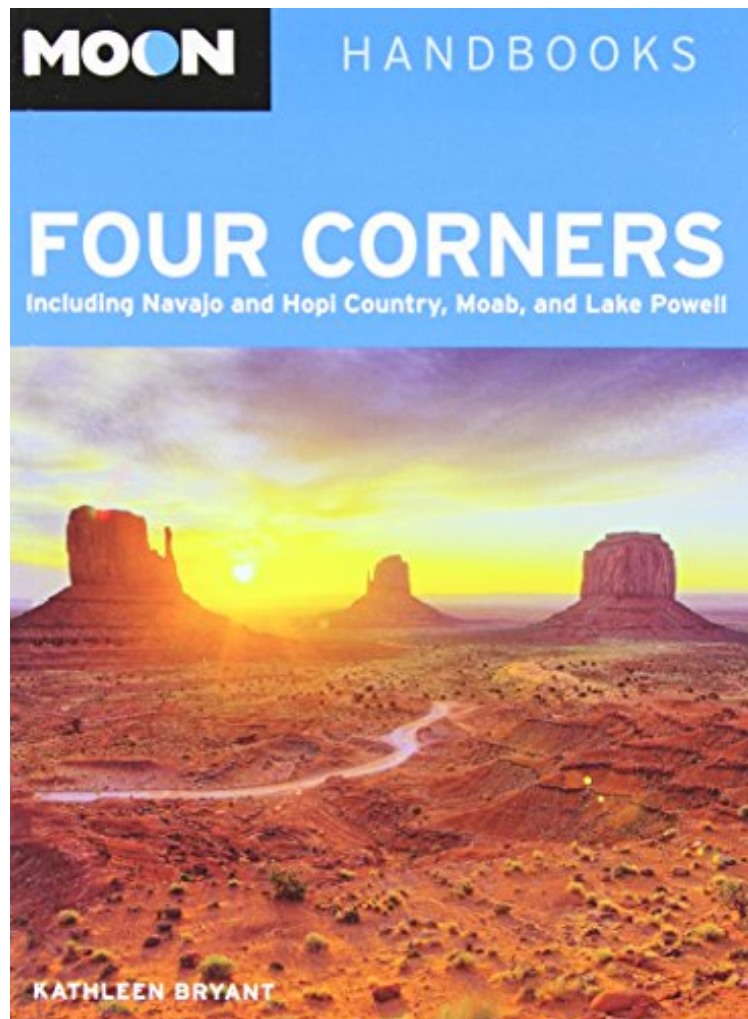

This book does a great job of telling you the best sites to visit, what roads to take to get there, where to stay overnight, and what restaurants to try. The scope of the book goes beyond my requirements to cover the four states converging at the

Four Corners. But everything I'm interested in seeing in New Mexico and Arizona is covered in detail. Also helpful is the cultural advice on how tourists should comport themselves so as not to offend tribal residents. There are suggested itineraries provided. But I'm putting together my own itinerary with the help of this book and a good map. The map is essential to see how the various sites connect by road. You will have to supplement this book with other guidebooks if you want to include Albuquerque and Santa Fe in your travel, as I do. I've found several interesting lodgings in Indian country in this book not mentioned in other guidebooks. It was frustrating to look up places, as they were arranged in what the author thought you needed an itinerary. I want to know about the area, but I don't want someone planning my itinerary for me. Maybe give an estimate of "you should spend no less than 4 days in this area to explore it completely", but not a weeklong route to follow. I didn't find much information on backroads and different out-of-the-way places to see. We got better information from the campers next to us. It would be helpful if these guides would include if dogs were allowed on trails or not, or if the city is dog friendly or not.
