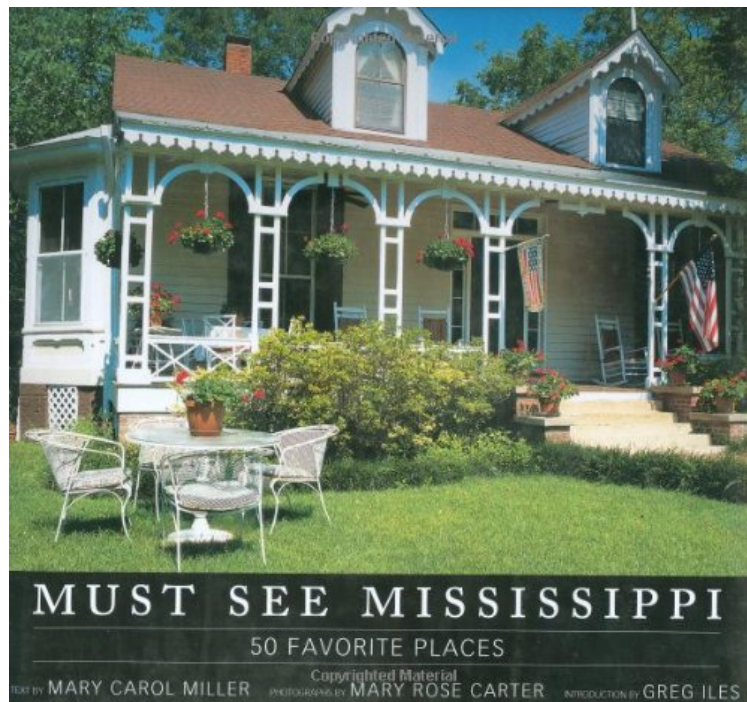

By Steppenwolf: Since there is no travel guidebook for Mississippi, I purchased this book when I went to the Vicksburg area, Mississippi. For one place, there about 4 pages explanation, including about 2 color pictures; it includes more of side stories of history of buildings. There is no general explanation or history of the places, no maps, no address, telephone number, or website information. For example, around the Vicksburg area, there are 6 places in the content section, as far as I searched in the web as follows: The Hill (p25), Shirley House (p31), Vicksburg's old courthouse museum (p111), Windsor (p115), First Presbyterian church of port Gibson (p123), Illinois monument (p117) (from the page number, one can say that the places are listed randomly, not in order; if the places in the close area are listed consecutively, this book could have been more useful). Among the 6 places, for those who have never been to Vicksburg, one can figure it out only one place in Vicksburg. Although both Shirley House and Illinois monument locate in the Vicksburg National Military Park, there is no information in the content or Index section, suggesting that these places are in Vicksburg. Thus, I recommend this book only for the persons who have visited Mississippi, and use the book for memoir, not for guidebook. However, the pictures and side stories of buildings are good. So, for those who decide the places to visit based on nice-looking pictures or the stories behind, this book may be still useful as a travel guidebook. If the publisher or the authors plan to publish the revision, I expect that they include maps, address, and website information, and list the place in some order. 1 of 1 people found the following review helpful. pictures of the 50 places throughout Mississippi. However, the book does NOT include a map showing where these places are anywhere in the book, so you have to look them up another way--map, googlemaps, etc. which is very time-consuming, unless you are very familiar with the state of Mississippi. It would have been so much better if they had numbered the 50 places, and then included a map of the state with the corresponding numbers on the map. It would have been even better if they had included that type of map at the beginning or end of the book, and then a map showing each place at the beginning of the section on that place. It would have made it so much easier to plan a vacation.
